








Total Applications Processed (CY24)





Total Pending Applications

- 317,370 End of FY22 Pending Applications
- 261,606 End of FY23 Pending Applications
 - 18% decrease from FY22

- **180,067** Pending Applications as of 6/3/2024
 - -49% decrease from FY22
 - -31% decrease from FY23



- NFA Division may not lawfully approve an application when it would place the transferee or maker of the NFA firearm in violation of law.
- As part of the NFA application process, NFA Division will submit the maker's or transferee's information to FBI-NICS to undergo a background check.
- NFA Division will not take final action on a NFA application unless FBI-NICS has responded with a "Deny," "Proceed," or has exhausted all resources attempting to resolve an "Open" background check.
 - An "Open" background check is one where there are records evidencing a firearms disability, but FBI-NICS is unable to make a final determination. For example, an arrest record for domestic battery, but there is no final disposition. FBI will attempt to contact the arresting agency or court for resolution.



NFA Division does not perform background checks.



- Previously, NFA Division processed applications on a First In First Out basis generally working the applications that were submitted in each month in successive order.
- Processing applications on a First In First Out basis is untenable when FBI-NICS is an "upstream supplier."
 - NFA cannot take final action on an application until it receives the background check response from FBI-NICS.




If not First In First Out, then what guides the processing?

- Responses from FBI-NICS.
- NFA Division is focusing its resources to review and process only those applications where there is a response to the background check.



- Swim Lanes:
 - Individuals
 - Individual Bundling
 - Trusts
 - Trust Bundling







- Currently, NFA Division is processing eForm Individual applications real time upon receiving a Proceed back from FBI-NICS.
- NFA Division often runs out of "proceeds" for eForm 4 Individual applications.
- When "proceeds" for eForm 4 Individuals are exhausted, examiners transition to processing eForm 4 Trust applications that have responses to background checks for **EACH** responsible person.



- My application is still pending but my friend's application that was submitted at the same time was approved, why?
 - Background check
 - Errors on the application
 - Errors on the supporting documentation
 - Trust v. Individual



- My background check has not been sent to FBI-NCIS, why?
 - Background check requests are submitted to FBI-NICS in daily batches.
 - This ensures the background check is performed and the response received when the NFA application is ready to be reviewed by an examiner.



- My background check was sent to FBI-NICS, but is still pending?
 - There are approximately 86,000 NFA background checks currently in a delayed or researching status with FBI-NICS.

- What can I do to ensure my background check is processed timely and accurately by FBI-NICS?
 - Although not required, providing your social security number avoids delays, especially if you are an instant proceed for GCA firearm transfers.
 - Avoids common name issues.



- Why is my Trust application taking so long?
 - Several additional review steps, for example:
 - Reading each trust document to ensure it is a legitimate trust;
 - Reading each trust document to ensure every responsible person to the trust submitted the required responsible person questionnaire;
 - Reviewing each responsible person questionnaire to ensure the information matches the information entered into eForms.



- What other factors attribute to longer processing times for trusts?
 - Failure to submit a responsible person questionnaire for each responsible person named in the trust;
 - Failure to submit a valid trust, e.g., there is only one person named in the trust and is identified as the settlor, trustee, and beneficiary (merger doctrine);
 - The name of the trust on the NFA application is different than the name of the trust in the trust document;
 - The information in the responsible person questionnaire does not match the information entered into eForms;
 - The background check is delayed for one or more responsible persons;
 - The trust applicant submits a responsible person questionnaire for a minor.



Coming Soon - Corrections within eForms

- Initially, only applicable to the eForm 4.
- The application can be returned once by an examiner for corrections.
- Corrections must be made and the application resubmitted within seven days.
- If the application is not resubmitted, it will be automatically disapproved.
- If all background checks already have Proceed(s), the resubmitted application will go back into the queue for final review and approval by an examiner.
